Your summer homework is to begin to research the areas of the specification above. It is your opportunity to show what independent research skills that you have. If this is done well it can be used as your first case study in your A Level.

- 1. Read and write a definition for **social equality**.
 - Do not just copy the first one that you come across. Write your own once you've read a range of sources.
- 2. How is social inequality measured?
 - Research and list several indicators (4 or 5) that can suggest what social inequality is like in an area. Consider social and economic indicators.
 - Explain HOW they can inform us about social inequality.
- 3. Use the UK Census website to create a case study to show contrasts in social inequality in Wyre Forest and an area of your choice. Try to think of somewhere that is in contrast to the Wyre Forest.
